HARDWICK - Vermont's Secretary of Eduon, Dan French, has indicated that he does not envision social distancing measures being discontinued any time soon. Local education leaders have shared what kind of expectations that staff and students may face if schools resume operations on campus next fall

Ponder Next School Year

Orleans Southwest Supervisory Union su perintendent Adam Rosenberg said that social distancing measures may be realistic in the classroom, especially for elementary schools

"We're waiting on guidance from the state regarding how to effectively implement so cial distancing at all grade levels," he wrote in an email.

"We've been told that the measures state has put into place, including school closures, has reduced the number of cases and deaths that would have occurred without them "he wrote. He continued that any num ber of deaths - currently 54 in Vermont - is not acceptable.

Katharine Ingram, chair of the Orles Southwest Elementary School Board, said she has not received any specific directions from the state on what may be changing next schoo year. She did say if there are new require ments, they would come with new challenges

OSUED Combines Woodbury, Lakeview **Principal Position**

Union Elementary District (OSUED) met May 27. Unified sports programming, school configurations and the Woodbury principal search were on the agenda.

Heather Freeman, the Orleans Southwest Supervisory Union's (OSSU) director of student services, gave an update to the board on the Woodbury principal search mittee's findings. She said that while the hiring committee believes it is best to have a full-time principal at Woodbury, the committee did not believe there is an appropriate applicant for the

iterim principal posi Board member Orise Ainsworth asked OSSII Superintendent Adam Rosen erg whether he continued to stand behind his recommendation that the principal position be combined for Woodbury and Lakeview for the coming year. Rosenberg said that he stood by the recommendation. After some discussion, Ainsworth made a motion to accept Rosenbergs's recommendation to combine the principal position for the 2020/2021 school year. The board passed the

Her motion was seconded by board member Phoebe Slater Board member Lauren Arcuri spoke in favor of putting off the project ter porarily, but not losing sight of the work entirely

The board discussed mmer retreat time to focu on the project. Ainsworth's motion was voted down, and the board decided to move forward on the project, perhaps at a retreat over the summer
